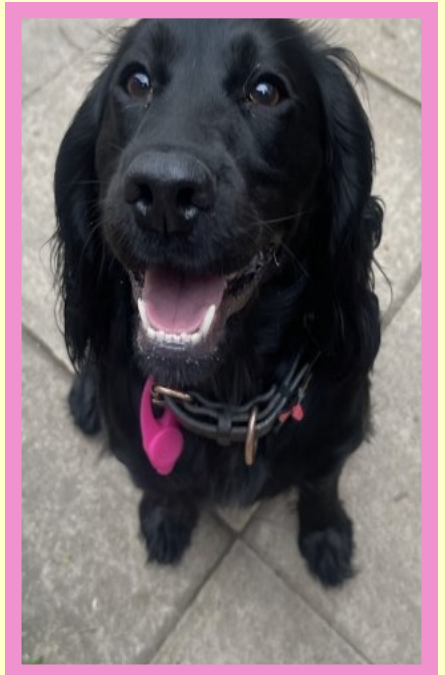

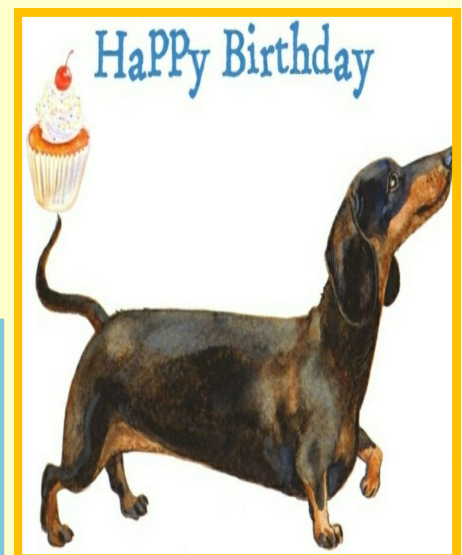

In **Nursery** we have our own snail farm! The children have collected some snails for us to observe and Teddy has brought in his two giant African snails and Mrs O'gardy has brought in another even bigger giant African snail. We have enjoyed watching them move leaving their silvery trail, eat and sleep (which they do a lot!)

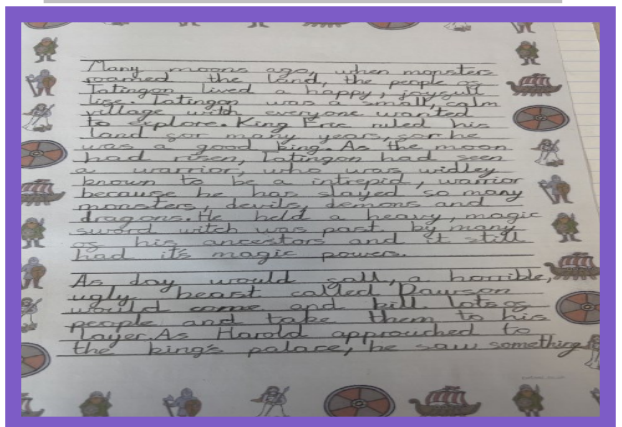


Year 6 continued developing their literal and abstract pieces, building on the techniques they have learned. They reflected on which approaches appealed to them most and began applying these in their own work. For example, Seb is creating a piece inspired by Fiona Rae, drawing on her signature abstract style.

In **Science, Year 5** used footballs and tennis balls to show how the Moon orbits Earth and how Earth orbits the Sun.



Year 3 have been debating this week things we should and should not do for our health and wellbeing. We took turns and showed respect for others ideas.



This week in **English, Year 4** published their traditional tales based on the story Beowulf.

In **Science, Year 2** have been investigating what plants need to grow. We tested four different plants: one with everything it needed to grow, one without water, one without sunlight, and one without soil. The children carefully observed the changes over time and discussed how each condition affected the plants' growth and health.



This week in **Reception** the children have been learning about planting and the lifecycle of a bean, we used materials to print and create a painting of sunflowers.



Year 1 enjoyed searching for different flowers. We found wild and garden flowers including lots of daisies.
